





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Getting started on the slopes

So you're thinking about a ski holiday? We've answered your FAQs to help you get the most out of your first time.



Q: Where do I go?

As with any holiday, you'll need to look through your options and pick a resort. To make it easy, we've marked our 'best for beginners' resorts – use the filters on the website or read the next few pages for ideas of where you could start your ski journey. Lots of beginners choose **Andorra** or **Bulgaria** as they're more affordable for your first time on the slopes.



Q: Do I really need to book lessons?

Even if your friends think they can teach you, always get lessons for your first time skiing or snowboarding – you'll learn the basics, meet other beginners and see the mountain with a local expert, aka your instructor.

Q: Do I need to take lessons before I go?

You don't need to take ski or snowboard lessons before you go. But if you fancy giving it a try before booking, take a couple of lessons at a snow centre.



Q: How does ski school work?

Ski school is typically for five or six days, and there are separate groups for adults and children. Full-day tuition is often available, but lots of beginners like half-day lessons in the morning, so they can practise in the afternoon.

Q: Which is easier, skiing or snowboarding?

There's an old saying that skiing is easier to learn but harder to master, whereas snowboarding is harder to learn but easier to master. You can start ski school as young as 3 or 4 years old in most resorts, but you often need to be 7 or 8 to take snowboarding lessons. If you choose to snowboard, look for a resort with fewer drag lifts as they can be difficult to get on and off with one foot attached to a board.

Q: What do I need to budget for?

You'll first need to choose a ski holiday package, which includes your flights, transfers and accommodation. And once you've picked one, you'll also need to think about ski clothing, equipment hire, lessons and your lift pass. Of course, activities and meals are other costs you'll need to consider. Lots of skiers choose half-board accommodation because it's usually good value for money, plus you can try local dishes on the mountain at lunchtime.



Q: Do I need to buy lots of ski clothes and equipment?

Most people pre-book their skis or board, boots and helmet hire, and then you just pick them up when you arrive. As for what to pack, you'll need a ski jacket and salopettes (ski trousers), ski gloves and goggles. Remember to pack some long ski socks too and warm layers, like microfleeces, and thermal tops and trousers. Borrow from your mates, get last season's kit online for less and browse the high street and charity shops for some bargains. Off the slopes, sturdy shoes, sunglasses, gloves and a hat will come in handy. And don't forget sun cream as the snow glare is strong, even on cloudy days.

Q: How can I get the best deal?

Pick a less popular week

Holiday prices increase with demand, so pick a time that's less popular - you'll often get a good deal on the week just after New Year.

Choose a good-value destination

Andorra and Bulgaria are well known for being good value. Not only do the holidays and lift passes generally cost less, but you can keep your spending down while you're away as food and drink on the mountain is easy on the wallet too.

Pick a lesser-known resort

Most well-known ski resorts have a lesser-known neighbour. For example, if you really want to ski in the Three Valleys, you could stay in Les Menuires over bigger name resorts like Méribel or Val Thorens.

Weigh up self-catering vs half board

Booking self-catering accommodation is cheaper initially, but buying in mountain supermarkets and eating out adds up quickly. Sometimes, booking a half-board hotel is more convenient and cheaper overall.

Go for entry-level skis

There's no need to book intermediate or advanced equipment for your first time you won't feel the difference if you're a beginner. Entry-level skis and snowboards are just fine.

Buy a local lift pass

It's unlikely you're going to cover an entire ski area on your first ski holiday, so ditch the area lift pass and stick to a local one. They're typically much cheaper.

Pick a resort with a beginner bundle

First-time ski or board bundles include your equipment, lessons and lift pass - it's the cheapest and most convenient way to get everything sorted. These packages are available in lots of holidays to Europe, including France, Italy, Austria, Andorra and Bulgaria.




How it works on your holiday

When your plane lands, we'll text you with info on where to find your transfer coach. And after you've got your bags, you can head straight there. Then you'll get your Welcome to the Mountain pack, which'll include info on any ski essentials you've booked, like lift passes, ski school and equipment hire.

It's worth going to pick up your equipment when you arrive in your resort so you're ready for your lessons the next day. You can still go in the morning before lessons start, but give yourself some extra time in case it's busy. At the end of your holiday, you'll need to return your equipment back to the shop.

On your first day of lessons, head to the ski school meeting point where your instructor will be waiting for you. They'll make sure you're in a group with other beginners like you.

Need help during your trip? You can call us any time and find useful resort info in our Ski Explorer app. Or ask a Crystal Rep - most of our resorts have one who can answer your questions. Then when your time on the slopes is coming to an end, we'll text you to let you know what time your transfer coach will pick you up to head back to the airport.





HOTELS

Best for: Convenience

The classic pick when it comes to where to stay. And some are especially good for families - look out for hotels with our own Crystal Childcare.

PROS

- Lots of facilities, from restaurants and bars, to swimming pools, saunas and full-blown spas.
- · Some have a kids' club and games rooms.

CONS

- Families sleep in one room, and larger families may need to stay in separate rooms.
- Usually the most expensive option upfront.





GUESTHOUSES

Best for: An authentic experience

Simple and cosy, you can look forward to a warm welcome and traditional décor here. You'll find most guesthouses in Austria (often called pensions), and sometimes Italy.

PROS

- Small and often family-run.
- Owners typically have loads of local knowledge.
- Lower costs upfront.

CONS

- · No fancy facilities, like swimming pools.
- · May be further from the slopes, unlike hotels that are often purpose-built near the ski lifts.





APARTMENTS

Best for: Space to spread out

Choose from one-room studios to bigger apartments with multiple bedrooms and separate living rooms. And you don't necessarily have to miss out on the facilities-front – some apartment buildings have their own restaurants, bars and pools, or share them with nearby hotels.

PROS

- Often budget friendly.
- Big families and groups can stay in one space.
- Full kitchen or a kitchenette with basic equipment like a microwave and hob.

CONS

- Supermarkets are small and can be pricey in resorts.
- You might need to pay extra for towels, bed linen and end-of-stay cleaning.
- Sometimes you need to make your own bed on arrival.

UNDERSTANDING BOARD BASIS OPTIONS

Self-catering: The flexibility to cook what you like, when you like – or still eat out if you want to.


Bed & breakfast: Get breakfast included and visit local restaurants for your other meals.

Half board: Your morning and evening meals are taken care of, and you can eat wherever you like for lunch.

Full board: Breakfast, lunch and evening meals are covered and paid for in advance, so you won't need to think about where to eat. But you will need to pay for drinks with your meals.

All-inclusive: All of your meals and some drinks are included. It's a good pick if you're happy to head back to the hotel at lunchtime, though you won't find many all-inclusive options in ski resorts.







A QUICK GUIDE TO SKI ACCOMMODATION FACILITIES

Some accommodation descriptions might mention the following. Here's what it all means.

Ski-in, **ski-out**: Accommodation that's close to a lift or piste – so getting on and off the slopes is easy.

Boot rooms: A communal, safe place where you can store your ski or snowboard boots.

Heated boot warmers: A storage rack that dries your boots at the end of the day and warms them up in the morning, so you can hit the slopes with toasty toes.

Ski lockers: A safe place to store your equipment. Most people put their boots, skis or snowboard, helmet, goggles and gloves in here.

Shuttle services: A bus that takes you to the slopes or ski lift. Look out for this if the accommodation is a little further out of the resort.

BEGINNER-FRIENDLY STAYS

Here's just some of our favourite accommodation for beginners – all a 5-minute walk or less from ski school.



BOROVETS | BULGARIA

The Hotel Rila couldn't be more convenient for ski school – the meeting point is right outside.

- * At the foot of the nursery slopes and opposite a chairlift, so getting around is so easy.
- * Extra-special spa with large indoor pool, hot tub, sauna, steam room and more.
- * Experience Borovets' famous nightlife in the hotel's own nightclub.

HOTEL AUSTRIA

NIEDERAU | AUSTRIA

This is your typical Austria stay, full-to-the-brim with Alpine style.

- * A Tyrolean theme throughout, from the wood-panelled dining room to the traditional bar.
- * It's only a 2-minute walk to ski school and the nursery slopes are right opposite the hotel.
- Head to the indoor pool, sauna and steam room for a spot of R&R.









VILLAGE MONTANA APARTMENTS VAL THORENS | FRANCE

Modern self-catering apartments with the option to eat out at either of the two onsite restaurants.

- * All apartments have a well-equipped kitchenette with hot plates, oven, microwave and dishwasher.
- * Borrow fondue and raclette machines from reception to cook French mountain classics.
- * Ski school's a 5-minute walk away.

HOTEL TAUERNHOF

KAPRUN | AUSTRIA

The Hotel Tauernhof might have opened as a traditional inn back in 1953, but these days it's full of top-notch facilities.

- * In the village centre and in front of the beginners' slopes, so it's easy to get to ski school.
- * Relax in the modern spa's indoor pool, saunas and steam room.
- * Traditional bar where you can sip a local tipple before your 4-course evening meal.





FRANCE

France has some of the highest resorts in the Alps, which means snow conditions are excellent, and the accommodation is usually close to the slopes too.

Best for: Après-ski & nightlife







Think ski resorts are just about skiing and snowboarding?
Think again. Here are just a few of our favourite things to do away from the slopes...



MOUNTAIN MEALS

Whether you're inside a cosy wooden chalet by the fire or in the spring sunshine on the terrace, there's nothing quite like a meal in the mountains. And it's not just your surroundings that'll knock your socks off – the food's one of our fave things about ski holidays. From gooey cheese fondue in France to lip-smackingly good goulash soup in Austria, each country's got its own must-try specialities.



FROZEN FUN


Gear up with a drysuit and oxygen tank, and dive into the frozen lake in Tignes-le-Lac, France, to see an underwater world of ice formations, shifting colours and bubbles. Or if you'd rather stay on top of the ice, take the wheel in a car, buggy or kart to drift around Europe's highest ice driving circuit in Val Thorens, France. To slow things down, glide across an ice rink on skates. Lots of resorts have one - and sure, you can go skating back at home, but it's 10 times better surrounded by snowy mountains. In some places, you can have a go at curling too, or cheer on local teams in an ice hockey match.





FEEL THE THRILL

Zoom through the forest on a snowmobile tour that'll leave you grinning from ear-to-ear. Or get a bird's-eye view of the slopes as you fly across them on a zipline – the highest one in Europe is in France's **Val Thorens**. It's a real resort highlight, starting up the mountain at 3,320m and stretching for 1.3km. Or to appreciate the views at a slower pace, you can paraglide over the mountains and valley in most big resorts.



MAKE A SPLASH

Pick somewhere to stay with a pool, hot tub or sauna where you can unwind, or go for a resort with an amazing public spa. In Austria, Kaprun's Tauern Spa has different 'worlds' of wellness bliss. And in Andorra, you can visit the modern Caldea Spa in the capital. If bigger is better, you'll love Europe's largest waterpark – the Aquamotion in Courchevel, France.







TIME TO CHILL

Sometimes it's the little things that make a holiday. Take a break from skiing or snowboarding for a lazy lunch up in the peaks. In the evenings, you can join a pub quiz in the local, challenge your mates to a board game, or cosy up by the fireplace with your favourite tipple and play a few rounds of cards.

A BEGINNERS' GUIDE TO APRÈS-SKI

A post-ski tipple is a classic way to end a day on the slopes. Here are our top après picks, from the lively to the laid-back.

VAL THORENS, FRANCE

Popular with younger groups, Val Thorens serves up some energetic après. Show off your best moves at La Folie Douce – a bar you'll find in a handful of French resorts, famous for its carnival atmosphere, colourful costumes and live music. On the run into the resort is 360 Bar, where drinks are cheaper and the atmosphere's just as fun.



SAUZE D'OULX, ITALY

Stop by Sport Cafè for a drink with a free slice of pizza before checking out some of the happy hour discounts in the town's bustling pubs. Ghost Bar has that cosy feel, but if you're into live music and DJ's, you'll feel more at home in Miravallino. And as it's the Piedmont region you can't go home without trying some of Italy's best vino in a local wine bar.

BOROVETS, BULGARIA

When it comes to nightlife, you get a lot of bang for your buck in Borovets. Find some slopeside action at the Black Tiger Bar, where a karaoke machine adds to the lively atmosphere. Or for something more traditional, look out for a mehana – a typical Balkan bar – where you can often see live folk music and dancing.



CERVINIA, ITALY

You won't find any wild mountaintop parties in Cervinia, as most of the action happens in smart hotel bars. The Après Ski Bar in the Hotel Principe delle Nevi is a top pick. Head here for a bombardino – a hot Italian cocktail made with advocaat and brandy – then chill out on the deck by the pool.

PAS DE LA CASA, ANDORRA

The liveliest resort in Andorra, 'Pas' packs a big après punch thanks to its huge choice of bars and affordable prices. Start by sipping a mojito at the mountaintop Iqos Terrace. Then in the evening, visit the Underground nightclub – it hosts top DJs from Ibiza to keep the party going all night long.


