Trips centred around the Wild West and country music? Yee-haw!

From TV's Yellowstone and America's Sweethearts: Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, to Beyoncé's Cowboy Carter and the revival of denim waistcoats, the cowboy craze is riding high. And I'm all in - I've been a country music fan since before it was cool (shoutout to my grandad for that).

And the world's Wild West obsession isn't just shaping music and fashion it's influencing travel, too. Horseback adventures and country music getaways are on the rise, and there's no sign of the momentum slowing. A quick search for 'cowboy TUI experiences' brings up a full-day horse riding experience on the historic Camí de Cavalls trail in Menorca. Or, if you're craving the real American frontier, you can hop on a guided TUI Tour to see the canyons, lakes and valleys of the USA's legendary national parks. But if you ask me, the real hidden gem is the Dominican Republic.

Leaving nothing but a trail of hoof prints in the dust, you can trot, canter





or gallop through forests and along white-sand beaches on a guided horseback ride in the Dom Rep - and you don't need to be a pro to join. You'll be picked up from your hotel and taken to a traditional ranch, where you'll get geared up and matched with a trusty steed. You might be coupled with 'Caramelo' or paired with 'Pinky'. Then, it's into the stirrups and up into the saddle to set off towards the mouth of the River Maimon, a protected natural area where local fishers vie for a catch. After that, country roads will literally take you home - you'll go through scenic countryside, past beaches and back to the ranch. It's the perfect way to see the Dominican Republic's landscape.

I'm also adding our first ever country music-themed cruise, setting sail on Marella Explorer 2 in February 2026, to my cowboycation list. I'm talking four nights of country music with stars like

The Shires and The Dolly Show, plus a big barn party with line dancing and themed whiskey cocktails. Ports you'll call in at include Malaga, Gibraltar and Lanzarote, so you can add some sight-seeing to your toe-tapping agenda. Plaid = packed.

But it's no biggie. I'll be partying on the piste at a winter festival instead - it's just a matter of which one. The mountains have got to trump a muddy field any day, and I've always wanted to try skiing or snowboarding.

First off, there's the Glasto of the winter world - Snowbombing in **Mayrhofen**, Austria. It's got a ton of fun events - think mountaintop brunching and chairlift speed-dating - and has hosted heavyweight headliners Fatboy Slim and Noel Gallagher. But it's not the only option.

What about Electric Mountain Festival? I can get free access to this massive piste-side party in **Sölden** with a lift pass. Oh, and I'd better ask for my martini 'shaken, not stirred' at après, as this Austrian resort starred in the James Bond film *Spectre*.

I'm as stoked about making my first turns on snow as I am for the beats. The good news? Alpe d'Huez, France, has standout beginner-friendly slopes, which puts Tomorrowland Winter high on my list. This festival's famous for its giant fantasy-inspired props, like an eagle guarding the decks – insanely cool, right? And the resort gets over 300 days of sunshine each year (that's gotta be more than Glastonbury...) The same's true for Spain's Sierra Nevada, so I'm factoring in Sun & Snow Weekend too. Spain's not your obvious ski destination, I know, but this place is a hotspot for first-time skiers AND festival goers.

Last up's Zermatt Unplugged in **Zermatt**, Switzerland, and a totally different different music vibe - goodbye electronic, hello acoustic. The scenic train transfer looks incredible, as does the Matterhorn mountain backdrop (the logo on the Toblerone bars we've all eyed up in duty-free).

Wherever I land, I'm sold on swapping my festival wellies for ski boots next year.



You're not alone if you're thinking about taking an alternative route for your next holiday. According to predicted travel trends for 2025, 'detour destinations' are the new hot thing. Over 63% of people surveyed said they'd be likely to take a detour from their main holiday destination to visit a lesser-known location – and to escape the typical tourist crowds.

And the easiest way to do it? In a hire car, we reckon. Seat belt on, music plugged in, snacks in the glove box - all that's left is to hit the open road. Ideally like the one in this photo. FYI, this is Canada's Icefields Parkway in Alberta, a province that's a rising star for detour destinations. Looks great, right? Rated one of the top drives in the world, this scenic highway links Lake Louise with

Jasper across 227 kilometres of rocky mountains, icefields and sweeping valleys.


There are loads of other places in Canada's great parks of the west you don't want to miss, either. Pack a picnic to eat in the wilderness of Jasper National Park, and bring your wellies for a trek around Moose Valley Provincial Park. Try and wrap your arms around a mammoth cedar tree in Glacier National Park. Or hike along part of the abandoned Canadian Pacific Railway line.

Luckily for you, we've got a self-drive TUI Tour that'll guide you through the lot. We'll give you a suggested route and a car, and whoosh - away you go. You're not chained to a strict agenda,

and our itinerary also gives you plenty of breathing room to find some of Canada's best-kept secrets on your own.

Some people travel for sun. Others for snow. But there's a new trend in the mix - travelling to see natural phenomena. **Karl Taylor** rounds up the top events and when to see them...

O1 Bioluminescence, the Maldives - June to October

Ah, the Maldives. Home to over 1,000 islands of white sand, turquoise waters and gently swaying palms. You might want to forget the sunbathing sessions for a second, though - a trip to the beach after dark to spot bioluminescent plankton is what we're talking about here. The plankton's electric-blue glow is caused by a chemical reaction that happens when it's moved by the waves, and it can be spotted on the shores across the archipelago. The summerautumn shoulder is the best time to see this phenomenon, which has been spotted on the shores of our TUI BLUE Olhuveli Romance hotel.

Northern Lights, Iceland -September to April

The Northern Lights were spotted across parts of the UK last year, but if you missed out - or fancy a second show - we'd recommend a trip to Iceland this winter. Why? It's near the Arctic Circle and has minimal light pollution, so it's one of the best places


to see the Northern Lights in the world. You might want to move quickly on this one, though - 2025 is forecasted to be another year of strong solar activity, which means the Northern Lights will make an appearance more often and will be easier to spot. *Immediately books a holiday to Iceland*

O3 Alpenglow, Canada - June to August

If you ask us, golden hour selfies are perfect for the front cover for your post-hol Insta drop. And, in Canada, you can switch up the usual beach backdrop for one with pink-hued peaks and valleys in Banff National Park. The colour change is caused by a phenomenon known as alpenglow, when the sun's light hits the mountains at a low angle, scattering blue light and leaving the longer wavelengths of red and pink light to illuminate the peaks. Visit from June to August for the perfect selfie - the Canadian Rockies light up at golden hour throughout the year, but there's a better chance of a cloudless sunset in the summer.


O4 Solar eclipse, Spain - August 2026

The next full solar eclipse is on the calendar for the 12th of August 2026. And, although the UK is missing out on a total eclipse this time, you've only got to take a short flight to witness the real deal. The path of totality will travel through east Greenland, west Iceland and northern Spain and we've got the deets on a super special way to see it. Marella Cruises' seven-night Cosmopolitan Charms itinerary will begin in Palma, Majorca and arrive at Palamos - on Spain's mainland - on the day of the eclipse. That evening, after you've set sail for your next destination, you can witness the solar eclipse while you're at sea. So, when you're asked where you were for the eclipse, you can mention the cocktail you were sipping on the ship's top deck. Bragging rights, secured, for life.






The Netherlands
Flowers are what the Dutch do best. And from March to May every year, bright tulips colour the bollenstreek - bulb region, to you and me. But the real magic's at Keukenhof. A smidge over 20 miles south of Amsterdam lies the world's largest bulbflower garden, where you'll find a whopping seven million bulbs and 800 varieties of tulips - no wonder it's the national flower of the Netherlands.



O2 Italy
Flowers don't immediately
spring to mind when you think
of Europe's boot, but Umbria nicknamed Italy's green heart
- changes that. Wild, wonderfully
unspoilt and wedged between the
peaks of the Sibillini Mountains,
Castelluccio's Piano Grande (or
great plain) comes alive with
colour every summer. It's creamy
crocuses one week, scarlet
poppies the next - both stretching
out in stripes for miles.

Think Japan, think gardens. The green spaces here are all about tranquillity. Come spring, locals flock to the gardens, parks and squares for hanami - or flower watching. Our fave spot? Tokyo's Shinjuku Gyoen National Garden. It's got more than a thousand sakura, or cherry blossom trees, which symbolise love and new beginnings in Japanese culture.



Morocco (04)

Gardens in this patch of Africa are a sanctuary from the desert dust. Beyond the maroon marketplaces of Marrakech, you'll find oasis-like pockets. Majorelle Gardens, made famous by fashion designer Yves Saint Laurent, wears the crown. Over three thousand plant species live here, including palms, cacti, coconut trees, weeping willows and water lilies.



Madeira (05)

This Portuguese island is the ultimate paradise for plant lovers. Nicknamed the Floating Garden, Madeira's carpeted in colourful stuff - bougainvillea burst from every backstreet, purple jacaranda trees line terracotta terraces and jade green vines cascade like chandeliers from pergolas. Pen in a visit to the Quinta da Boa Vista estate in the capital, Funchal, which has over 50,000 plants from passion flowers and aloes to rare towering orchids.



Thailand (06)

Escaping to Eden couldn't be easier in Thailand. From flower markets to botanic gardens, colour here is kaleidoscopic nowhere more so than the rosy Nong Han Lake, AKA the red lotus sea. Thousands of buoyant blossoms burst into life in spring, marking the end of the rainy season. The lotuses are best viewed by boat before noon, when the flowers are fully open.

Es Baluard

This waterfront museum of modern and contemporary artwork celebrated its 20th birthday in 2024, and it's home to more than 700 works of art, including pieces by Pablo Picasso and Salvador Dali.

La Llotja

As you go past this 15th-century seafront building, you'll probably catch a glimpse of its twin turrets and an angel over the door, then ask yourself, "Is it a castle or a church?" But the answer's neither. During Majorca's maritime trading boom, it was used as a storage space for goods and guns. Since then, it's been a fine art gallery, and nowadays it hosts cultural exhibitions.

Castell de Bellver

You'll really have to keep your eyes peeled for this 14th-century fortress, which is nestled up in the hills above the city. For a close-up, hang around Palma for a day or two after the race. It's worth visiting just for the sweeping views across the city and the bay, while the history museum here is a bonus.

Palma Cathedral

While you're running in the race, you'll be forgiven for slowing down as you go past this Gothic masterpiece. It took 400 years to build, and the race route covers all four sides. Keep your eyes peeled for the enormous rose window, which features over 1,200 pieces of glass.


TUI BLUE Barut Andiz

It's the kind of place where staff members will gather, unprompted, to wave you away on your last day, or make you feel like a VIP when you sit down for dinner. Speaking of food, it's another thing this hotel does so well - Tripadvisor raves about its three restaurants, especially its Italian à la carte.



What do Tom Hardy, Dua Lipa, and this hotel have in common? They've all walked away from awards ceremonies clutching a Best Newcomer trophy. It's hardly surprising, though - this Cypriot spot is the epitome of holiday opulence. Suites come with espresso machines and marble bathrooms, while luxe touches include cold towels delivered to your sunlounger, and a bottle of bubbly left in your room a few days before your leave.





Riu Gran Canaria

More is more, and this XL spot in the Canary Islands officially crowned our Best Large Hotel - proves why. From above, the property looks like it's in the middle of a desert oasis, thanks to an expanse of lofty palms. Zoom in, and there's no shortage of pools (including a boujie infinity pool for adults), as well six places to eat and as many bars. Cleverly, some of them are self-service, so there's always somewhere to keep yourself topped up with cocktails and snacks.

Then, something interrupts your scroll - a hotel with super-stylish interiors.

Riu Palace Tikida Taghazout has entered the chat • •

You're instantly hooked. With every swipe on the trending vids, something new piques your interest - from the floor-to-ceiling windows with views of the Atlantic Ocean to the marble

accents. You'd expect nothing less with the reputable name of RIU on the door. This place nails interior trends left, right and centre. The lobby bar is botanical chic to a T. Plants cascade from ceiling chandeliers, there's greenery growing out of the bar, and the seating spaces - with rich fabrics reflecting the colours of Moroccan riads - look like the place to sip traditional mint tea.

The rest of the lobby has a whole different vibe. It's pretty neutral - a world away from the oranges and blues of the bar - and filled with faux peacocks and zebras. And light floods in from giant skylights - another hint this hotel does everything in style.

A pretty pool is high on my holiday wishlist (shoutout to the water babies), and Riu Palace Tikida

Taghazout delivers on the detail. The hotel's swish geometric shape extends to the pool area, where tall, leafy palms line the edge, giving the illusion they're growing out of the water. Daybed platforms jut out into the blue. And the lounger-lined terrace? Chef's kiss.

And speaking of the water, the swim-up suites = immaculate I can picture myself wandering in a dressing gown through the Scandi-inspired space, catching a sorbet sunrise from my private pool terrace. It's POV access without having to leave your sofa.

If you ask me, the hotel's designer deserves a pat on the back - every inch of this place is social-worthy. With the cuppa untouched and a credit card in hand, I bet you can guess what happened next. #TikTokMadeMeBookIt...

BLUE with a view

Some hotels might have a slick infinity pool, a private beach, or even a luxe spa. Not to brag, but this place has the lot - but it's the views that trump them all. **Shaun Ringwood** sees how they stack up...

TUI BLUE Seno is on a forest-clad hillside on the Turkish coast, tucked away from pretty much everything. As we zig-zag up sloping roads, I start to wonder just how remote this place really is. It turns out... very.

The address, in fact, is a bit of a red herring - the hotel's technically in the resort of Sarigerme, but the village centre passes us by as we follow the weaving inland lanes. And the reason this adultsonly pad puts itself at arm's length from civilisation becomes clear when we arrive at the reception.

That's when a golf buggy materialises, and we trundle down flower-lined lanes to reach rooms that gaze out across a bright blue bay. They have a mountain chalet charm to them – pretty compact, with some peeking out from the trees and others beneath the canopy. At every





turn, my eyes are drawn to panoramas that look like a landscape painting brought to life.

The next morning, the hazy coastal outline of Dalaman comes into focus as the sun rubs the sleep from its eyes, and sailboats, canoes and jet-skis paint patterns across the water with their wakes. By midday, the islands off the coast become blocky silhouettes that twinkle as the rays bounce off the surf. When I gather up my sunbathing essentials at the end of the day, a dusky dance of colours keeps me guessing - will I see shades of pink and purple or a striking streak of red and orange?


And the best bit? I never feel stressed about finding a spot to soak it all in. A private beach treats me to the ebbing and flowing sounds of the sea, and one of the highest points of the hotel is furnished with a quiet pool where the seaside sunloungers seem to shrink to doll size when I peer down. In short, this hotel has the sort of scenery that makes the rest of your camera roll green with envy. All you need to do is find your favourite angle...

Turning the tide

The TUI Care Foundation is working hard around the world to help look after natural environments and support local communities in travel destinations. In Majorca, it's all hands on deck to protect the Mediterranean Sea's 'super plant'...

Picture Majorca, and I'm guessing the likes of sandy coves, sweeping bays and towering mountains come to mind. However, there's a whole other side to Spain's biggest Balearic Island that rarely gets a look in - partly because it's a little harder to spot from your sunlounger - and it plays a vital role in protecting the planet.

I'm talking marine life, and more specifically, a 'super plant' called Posidonia (named after Poseidon, the Greek god of the sea, of course). The seagrass is native to the Mediterranean, and it can live for more than 100,000 years.

As well as helping to keep the waters around here clear, it also provides a haven for some of the 400-plus species of fish and mammals that call this area home, including sperm whales and dolphins. Safe to say, it's rather important, and the TUI Care Foundation certainly thinks so. That's why it's working with local non-profit organisations like the Marilles Foundation to try and reverse some of the damage that's been done to the seagrass before it's too late.

Jaume Amengual is a seventh-generation fisher, who's been sailing the waters around Majorca for more than three decades, and he's noticed the changes more than most. "Excessive maritime traffic, the noise produced by the engines and anchoring on Posidonia are all factors that threaten the ecosystems of our islands. There are more boats now than ever, sailing at enormous speeds, producing an awful noise and disturbing the marine life."

Together, both foundations and Jaume are working to protect and restore around 35 square kilometres of coast and seascapes to help create the perfect conditions for animals like sharks, rays and groupers to flourish.





But that's not all. As part of its TUI Sea the Change Balearics project, the TUI Care Foundation is training dozens of local fishers in marine conservation and increasing the number of sustainable tourism experiences on the island over the next few years.

"Protecting the sea is a shared responsibility," says Alex Panczuk, Executive Director of the TUI Care Foundation. "With our TUI Sea the Change Balearics project, we're on a mission to transform the Balearics into a beacon of marine conservation."

So, next time you're heading to Majorca, keep your eyes peeled for the super plant keeping the sea shimmering, and the locals doing their bit to preserve it.

Thrifty, nifty and vintage Scena meet Junch



Scenario: you meet a friend for lunch, to catch up after her most recent holiday to Paris. She wants to talk fashion purchases and designer labels.

You're turned off at the thought of the prices. "But look," she says, "look at what I got in Le Marais - a Christian Lacroix wool coat for under €50, and a Nina Ricci leather bag for even less." Le Marais is right in the city centre, she tells you, describing how it's packed with second-hand stores and charity shops.

Interest piqued, you pick up your phone and start searching for city breaks to Paris. "Take an empty suitcase," your friend tells you. "You can buy your whole holiday wardrobe

while you're there – it doesn't have to be designer, but it could all be second-hand, and not expensive at all." OK, you're sold. A bit more scrolling and you've found yourself a perfect Parisian city break (with TUI, obvs). All that's left to do is count down the days until you leave. And to find a suitcase with plenty of room for your future shopping.

Sure, this scenario might sound cheesy, but the general gist is happening in real time. A 2025 travel predictions survey saw over a third of travellers say they'd be hitting shops and markets abroad to buy their holiday wardrobe, rather than doing it before their trip.



Influenced by climbing clothes prices at home, this shift isn't just about style - it's about staying savvy.

And there's no end of places to shop for holiday garb abroad, from thrift stores and local markets to charity shops.

Paris is a particularly good destination for jumping on this trend – it's not known as the fashion capital of the world for nothing. Le Marais, as mentioned, is a great shopping destination, and so are the streets of the 10th arrondissement district, which are lined with vintage stores – perfect for picking up a second-hand Chanel shirt or a pair of Louis Vuitton shoes. Elsewhere, the sprawling Marché aux Puces de Saint-Ouen, in the north of Paris, is the largest second-hand clothing and



antiques market in the world. Planning ahead also means that finding a bargain overseas won't be just a spontaneous holiday moment, but a pivotal part of your adventure.

The survey showed that nearly 60% of travellers intend to be thriftier on holiday, while 67% are tightening their money belts to maximise on experiences instead.

If you meet the brief because you're on a budget, we also recommend making a beeline for Ibiza. Es Cana Hippy Market, on the west coast of the island, has been kitting out fashion-forward holidaymakers for decades. It flaunts over 450 stalls, selling everything from colourful kaftans to beach dresses. You'll see a massive seventies influence in loads of the clothes sold here - think psychedelic patterns, cheese-cloth shirts and leather sandals. Plus, a lot of it's handmade by the locals, so you'll be supporting the community by spending your money here.

We've also got Dubai on our radar for cheaper fashion choices. The souks in Bur Dubai - the oldest neighbourhood in the city - specialise in locally produced textiles. There are tailors to hand in the cubby-hole stands, who can measure you up for whatever holiday outfit you might be after. Dubai's got a lot of attractions and religious sites that require modest clothing, so Bur Dubai's a great shout for picking up cover-up clothes on the cheap.

Wherever your next destination, leaving space in your case is key if you want to buy your holiday wardrobe abroad. Fitting, then, that you get a 20kg luggage allowance as standard when you fly with TUI Airways*, so there's no need to debate whether or not you'll have room for those new shoes on the way home.

What's your Roman Empire?

With our interest in the Roman Empire renewed (thanks TikTok and *Gladiator* II), we reveal four of your favourite amphitheatres in the world.



On The Colosseum, Italy
It's a no-brainer this o

It's a no-brainer this one's first on the list. Hailed as one of the New 7 Wonders of the World, the Colosseum is the world's largest amphitheatre. Twice as long as a football pitch, it was big enough to flood for mock naval battles (though, there's no evidence of sharks à la *Gladiator II*). Live your best historical life and pair your visit here with a trip to the Roman Forum and Palatine Hill.

Special mentions in Italy also go to the **Amphitheatre of Capua** and the **Amphitheatre of Pompeii**, both near Naples. The Amphitheatre of Capua is famous as the training ground of Spartacus, history's most renowned gladiator. We'll forgive you for reenacting that iconic scene from the 1960s film... IYKYK. Join one of our daytrips, led by local experts, to explore its underground tunnels and get the lowdown on its hidden secrets.

The Amphitheatre of Pompeii, on the other hand, is the oldest surviving Roman amphitheatre in the world (bank for a pub quiz or to impress your 'random facts' friend). In its heyday, it seated about 20,000. Walk in the footsteps of the locals who lived there before Mount Vesuvius erupted in 79 AD, and be sure to visit the ancient theatre, frescoed villas and Roman baths, too.







El Jem Ampitheatre, Tunisia (02)This North African marvel, declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is famed for its long underground tunnels, where wild animals and gladiators were held, and steep three-tiered seating. Set in flatlands away from town, it's usually quieter than its Italian counterpart, and you can climb to the top level and gaze down over the arena. Hop on a tour with us to tick it off, alongside the Great Mosque of Kairouan (more on page 34) and an ancient medina.




Pula Arena, Croatia
Pula Arena is Croatia's bestpreserved Roman structure.
In fact, it's the only remaining
Roman amphitheatre to have
four side towers intact. It's set
in a pretty scenic spot, too, by
the port. Today, you can explore
its stone passageways, and see
exhibits on the Istria region's
ancient oil and wine production.
Plus, you can dress up in Roman
attire and have a novelty photo
taken - say grapes!



Arena of Nimes, France Gladiator duels, animal hunts and sieges. This one's seen it all, and the fight for entertainment lives on today - Metallica, Dire Straits and Dua Lipa have all performed here. See the arena in all its glory at the Festival de Nimes, staged here every summer. We won't gatekeep the other Roman sites in Nimes either... the city isn't called the 'French Rome' for nothing. We're talking Maison Carrée, one of the best-preserved Roman temples in the world, and the Tour Magne watchtower.

Think Tunisia's all sun, sea and sand? Think again. It's home to not one, but nine UNESCO World Heritage sites. **Jessica Houtby** explores three...

A thin scarf drapes over my head and shoulders. The heat presses down as I step into a vast open-air courtyard. A prayer hall beckons ahead, where towering, studded wooden doors stand guard. Non-Muslims, like me, may only glimpse inside – never enter.

Through a gap, I catch sight of a sea of rugs blanketing the floor - each one a labour of love, handwoven by local women and offered as a gift to Allah. The rich colours stand out in the filtered light. Where am I? The **Great Mosque of Kairouan** - one of North Africa's most sacred Islamic monuments, and the first of my triple-header of Tunisia's landmarks protected by UNESCO...

For decades, holidaymakers have been drawn to this North African country for its Mediterranean coastline and toasty temps. But they're just the beginning. Arabic, African and European influences all come together to craft a rich tapestry of culture and history. And nowhere is this more evident than in UNESCO-listed Kairouan, one of the holy cities of Islam.

The Medina of Tunis, in the capital city, is next on my UNESCO list. Just a short drive from the popular resort towns of Sousse and Hammamet, this 730-acre labyrinth of mosques, souks and artisan workshops is one of the best-preserved old quarters in the Islamic world. My guide, Wissem – a proud TUI Expert – grins as he declares: "Bartering is a sport in Tunisia." He's not wrong. Sellers call out from their stalls, and the air is

thick with the scent of the jasmine and harissa they're peddling. Piles of spices glow in rich reds, shoemakers carve out leather and rug weavers sit in quiet concentration. I can't help but wonder - are these being made for Kairouan?

A short drive later, I find myself getting wonderfully lost at the UNESCO-rated ruins of Carthage - once a mighty trading hub, now a silent testament to a turbulent past. Here, Rome's conquest in 146 BC has left behind fragments of grand baths and crumbling columns. I wander among the arches and pillars - touching the rough edges - and find reprieve from the sun in a stone-hewn tunnel. "Let's climb to the top of Byrsa Hill for the best views over the ruins, the Gulf of Tunis and the Punic Ports next," says Wissem. Circularshaped, the ports were once used by the Carthaginian navy to see out to sea while remaining hidden from approaching enemy ships. Very clever.

Looking out over the ports, now I understand that Tunisia isn't just a beach destination. It's a place to feel, to breathe in and to lose yourself in history. That scarf still rests on my shoulders, now carrying the first scents and memories of this trip. Three UNESCO sites down, six to go...

The bees' needs



To Bee Museum, or not to Bee Museum - that is the question. And our answer is always yes...

Imagine you're stood in a flower-studded field on the Greek Island of Rhodes. The sun toasts the top of your head, but it's not too hot - because you're wearing a beekeeper suit. And you're not just in a field. You're in an apiary, where bees are kept. A tour guide - trained by National Geographic - stands beside one of the rainbow-painted hives dotting the grass, demonstrating how bee colonies are organised. And the whole idyllic scene's soundtracked by the gentle, constant buzzing of bees.



Welcome to the **Bee Museum** of Rhodes - the only attraction of its kind in Greece, and a celebration of all things beerelated. More honey is eaten in Greece than any other country in Europe, so it's fitting that you'll find this attraction here. In the museum, you'll get a full deep-dive into the crucial role bees play in our planet's ecosystem - like how a third of all the food we eat depends on pollination, and how we'd lose lots of earth's plants if bees became extinct.

As well as stepping into a beekeeper suit and saying hello to the bees in person, you'll get to examine the life of a hive up close. You'll learn lots of simple ways to protect the bees in your back garden, too. And, you'll channel your own inner bee by joining a hands-on simulation of honey extraction.






Your visit includes a honeytasting session, too, so you'll get to sample freshly extracted honey, as well as a local delicacy called melekouni. It's made from sesame seeds, orange peel and spices - and, of course, locally produced honey.

This famous sliver is topped with glitzy hotels and a ribbon of sugary sand, all within touching distance of cultural gems and jungle jaunts. Sophie Heward lines up seven of Mexico's top picks that hit the jackpot.

In Holbox Town, all the roads are dusted with sand - a constant reminder that you're on a tropical island.

I sit on the deck of a catamaran, skimming over waves so blue it's like they've been Photoshopped, with the shoreline of Isla Mujeres growing closer. I catch a glimpse of a sea turtle at the water's surface, and it's a real pinch-me moment. This island makes my list of Mexico must-sees before I even arrive.

When my toes hit the sand, it feels as soft as sherbet. There's a buzz in the air - music floats from beach bars, and shop owners offer tastes of tequila. I hop on a golf cart and zip around the island, passing quiet coves and colourful bunting (known to the locals as 'papel picado').

At dusk, I head out on trip number two - a Day of the Dead celebration. An iconic symbol of this event is a skeleton named La Catrina, and a dressed-up version of her is waving at me as I arrive. I wander through the trees to a clearing that lights up with a fire show. Acrobats with sugar skull face paint juggle burning hoops, and I feel waves of heat from fire-breathing displays. After, I'm led underground to a cenote for a four-course Mexican feast. The cooler setting's a real contrast - plus, it's not every day you get to eat dinner in a cave.

Speaking of cenotes, they're my third must-do. These natural grottos are sinkholes filled with fresh water, and they were important to the Ancient Maya people - the Yucatan Peninsula doesn't have any typical rivers or lakes, so cenotes were a sacred water source.







Catamaran to Isla Mujeres Eight miles off the coast of Cancun sits Isla Mujeres. It's home to the ruins of the Temple of Ixchel, the Goddess of the Moon.





A choice of adventure parks

You can swim through nature at Xcaret Park, zip-line past treetops at Xplor and zoom down waterslides at Xel-Há.





The stars align when I visit the Tsukán cenote and find it empty, apart from a few bat colonies swooping between stalactites. A dip in the chilly water feels like a lottery win in the midday heat.

Trip number four takes me shopping in Playa del Carmen. As I wander down La Quinta Avenida, I'm spoilt for choice - I've got high-street giants like Zara, and trinket shops overflowing with handmade ornaments and vibrant fabrics. Inviting wafts of tacos drift from beachfront restaurants, and sandwich boards offer happy hour cocktails.

I visit a natural theme park - Xcaret Park - for my fifth rec. As I weave along jungle pathways, I spot monkeys and iguanas, and people swimming through rivers that lead underground. I take a dip in a rocky lagoon and see shiny fish darting past my ankles. Then, I dry off with a swing in a seafront hammock hung between giant palm trees. Total bliss.

If nightlife's your thing, you'll love number six. Xoximilco, AKA the

'floating fiesta', is as lively as it sounds. I walk across wooden bridges and spy lit-up gondolas setting sail one by one. When I board, our host serves local food platters (I politely decline the fried grasshoppers, but I'm told they're a tasty snack) and tequila slammers, before we bob past a mariachi band. There's plenty of dancing - think conga lines and Mexican waves - and the locals seem to love it as much as I do.

And, finally, lucky number seven – Isla Holbox. I'm in awe as I sail towards glassy water dotted with pelicans, and sandbanks that look like they could melt away at any moment. It feels almost otherworldly. The centre of town is just as captivating, but in an entirely different way. I roam through colourful streets flecked with candystriped ice-cream shops, hand-painted murals and stairways leading to Mexican cooking classes. I feel like I've struck gold with this place.

"It helped me join the dots in ways I didn't expect," Tara says. We'd been on the Spirit of the Maroons TUI experience, where we'd met one of the last populations of maroons - descendants of a warrior-like community who freed themselves from slavery. "My mum always used to tell me that my great-great-grandmother was a maroon," Tara explains, "but I never really knew what that meant." On the daytrip to Charles Town - one of only five maroon communities left in Jamaica - we listened to stories of the maroons' fight for survival, and danced, hip-to-hip, with the village elders. It unearthed a powerful ancestral bond for Tara.

But it was the Kingston & Blue Mountains tour that Demi found really special. Dressed in a mood-lifting mix of pastel, stripes and neon that pops strikingly against the jade-green palm leaves and polished red steps in front of the Craighton Estate coffee plantation, Demi reflects. "I recently found out that my great-grandfather was a coffee farmer here in Jamaica, so understanding the history of coffee production on the island has given me a whole new level of respect for him." Experiencing all aspects of her heritage is essential to Demi. "I feel more tied to my culture than ever before. And I've discovered more about my history, too it's incredible."

Coffee aside, the Blue Mountains also surprised Alanna. "I'm from Barbados, which is a really flat island," she tells me. "Being thousands of feet above sea level is such a mad, magical experience." The fashion influencer goes on to explain how visiting a new island helped her reconnect with her roots. "It's really important I truly immerse myself in all our vast Caribbean cultures. The islands are all similar, but certainly not monolithic, and Jamaica has showed me how bold and beautiful we can be." She stares, lovingly, out the window as our bus emerges from the mist at the foothills of the mountains, "My heart's been singing at every point of this journey."

As we travel back to our hotel, chatting about how cultural experiences can shape a holiday, Adrian sums up our trip perfectly. "It's more than travel. It's rediscovery and connection."

"Going back to Jamaica with my wife, learning about our backgrounds in such a meaningful way is priceless. It's more than travel. It's rediscovery and connection."



More than just for smelling good, perfume in the Emirates represents spirituality, ritual and nostalgia. Through Islam's teachings of cleanliness, fragrance is often used in pre-prayer washes. It's even incorporated into clothing - traditional

Emirati men's robes have tie-like tassels, which, in the days of the Bedouins, wives would dip in fragrance to remind their nomadic husbands of home.

And while it's impossible not to catch a whiff of something luxurious as you wander through the city's supersized malls, our Heritage of Emirati Perfumery experience favours tradition over glamour. The head notes of this experience introduce you to the souks of Old Dubai, where you'll sniff out commonly used ingredients, like frankincense and oud. As the tour's heart notes emerge, you'll visit a perfumier to stock up on oil - the essence of all Arab perfumes, instead of alcohol sprays, which are prohibited in Islam. The base notes round off the

trip with a fragrance workshop, where you'll concoct your own signature scent to take home.

This tour's led by one of the UAE's first female tour guides, and the workshop takes place in the building her family once called home. In the Arab world, perfumery is a science, an art, and a language all at once, and on this day out, you'll uncover the layers of Emirati history and culture, one scent at a time.

Luxepacking

The changing face of Thai travel

The backpacker - a holidaymaker you can clock at a moment's glance, usually thanks to a bursting-at-the-seams rucksack. These intrepid explorers have long been cramming two weeks' worth of belongings into Tardis-like bags, trading out the home comforts so that they can travel light. Their natural habitat? The dot-to-dot tourist trail in Thailand, where hostel stays and a single pair of flip-flops usually set the tone, with beach parties thrown in at regular intervals.

But is the appeal of the backpacking break starting to lack? Experts in the Far East certainly seem to think so, as more and more holiday eggs are being shifted into the luxury basket. The Tourism Authority of Thailand has seen a surge in North and South American visitors seeking luxury getaways, and they're expecting Europe to follow suit. Sure, people still want to chop and change between different parts of Thailand, but they want to do it in a swanky suite instead of a dorm with a shared bathroom.

In fact, the powers that be in Thailand are certain that high-end travel is the future. They've even collaborated with fashion heavyweights Louis Vuitton to create a glam city guide for Bangkok, tapping into the city's gourmet foodie scene, designer shopping appeal and swish hotel offering. And the roster of glitzy beachside properties further south is on the rise, so you can sample the classic backpacker bits without scrimping on where you stay.

That's where the age of the multi-centre holiday is starting to dawn. At their core, these getaways do exactly the same thing that a backpacking holiday does - you see a bunch of different spots in a single trip. The difference is that you get all the trimmings of a package break, rather than the stress of organising every last detail yourself.

All of the Thai big hitters are on the cards, too - you won't be waiting in the wings while the backpackers hog centre stage. The limestone cliffs of **Krabi** have long been the backdrop for gap year photo albums, but the digs in this part of Thailand have had a glow-up. Rooftop infinity pools and candlelit beach restaurants have ushered in a new type of traveller, and the traditional longtail boats and marshmallow-white beaches are still right under your nose.

Ever-lively **Phuket** has plenty in the way of basic bases, as visitors flock to the likes of Patong Beach to bar-hop along Bangla Road. But hotels have cottoned on, with pool parties and beach clubs starting to make a mark on the party map, almost on a par with the most renowned spots. In fact, names like Kata Beach, Karon Beach and Mai Khao are really starting to make waves on the luxury living front. Even the famous Phi Phi Islands - usually a bumpy boat trip away from Phuket Town - are starting to step out from the tourism shadows. The jungle-draped mountainous islands are now home to a handful of handsome hotels, well away from the madding crowd - eat your heart out, hostel dorm.

Even if you're out in the sticks, finding something with a decent star rating is starting to become much easier. Khao Lak's known for being a little off grid - people come here to visit elephant sanctuaries, national parks and wildlife-crammed mangroves. And the boutique hotels that have started to crop up follow a tasteful blueprint - they're designed to blend in to the backdrop seamlessly. It's the same story over in Koh Samui - backpackers once considered this their best-kept exotic secret. It's a bit like a big Malteser - just replace the bubbly centre with a blob of dense jungle, and the chocolatey exterior with a wraparound of blonde beaches. The only difference from Khao Lak? The hotels are even more swanky, and cuddle up to the shoreline as close as possible.







When life gives you lemons...

...you make lemonade. In Sorrento, though, lemons make so much more than this zesty drink, as **Sophie Heward** discovers.



For more than a thousand years, the Italian town of Sorrento has grown lemons that're in a league of their own. They're bigger than most, they smell extra strong and they're seriously juicy. It's no wonder why this sunshiny fruit springs to mind when you think of south-west Italy.

In the middle of the town, just a short stroll from those iconic pastel-painted cliffside houses, sits **Relais Correale** and **La Limonaia**. This citrus-themed hotel and restaurant is plotted among 8,000 square-metres of fragrant lemon groves – for reference, that's a similar size to Wembley Stadium. It used to be a farmhouse, but today this place is a celebration of all things lemon. You can tour the orchard, join cooking classes, stay overnight and sample fresh marmalade and limoncello. Ade Botta, the manager at Relais

Correale and La Limonaia, has bags of enthusiasm for what she does. "I love my job, firstly because of the people I meet. It's wonderful to see such passion for the land and for our business. When people visit us and learn about the lemon groves, they tend to leave a little part of their heart here in Sorrento," she says.

Quick warning – if your cabin crew haven't brought the food and drink trolley through yet, this might make you hungry. The restaurant, La Limonaia ('lemon house' in English), crafts everything from grilled mozzarella wrapped in fresh lemon leaves to prawns flambéed with limoncello. One of the most popular dishes is the ravioli. Ade's a big fan, saying, "The pasta's all handmade. It's stuffed with local ricotta and, of course, we finish it off with a helping of lemon cream."



Those with a sweet tooth have plenty of choice, too. You can cool things down with a bowl of zingy lemon sorbet, or treat yourself to some bubbles in a limoncello spritz on the tree-dotted terrace. "Our gardens are like an oasis in the centre of a busy seaside town," says Ade. "We've got so much to show our guests, and a beautiful space where they can relax in the sun afterwards."

If you're ready for an afternoon on the lemon farm, you can book your visit through TUI experiences. Tours run throughout the summer, and some come with lunch included. The best time to visit is between April and June, when the trees are in full bloom and the fruit's bursting with colour. What better way to get to know Sorrento?



Make your own limoncello Snap a photo of this recipe and take a little slice of Sorrento home with you

- O1 Peel 1kg of lemons, add the skins to a large jar and cover them with 1l of 90% pure alcohol.
- O2 Let the lemon peel and the alcohol infuse in a dark place for 10 days before straining your mixture.
- O3 Combine 500g of sugar with 11 of water to make sugar syrup, and then mix it with your lemony alcohol.
- O4 Pop your freshly made limoncello in a fridge to cool, et voila enjoy it on ice or in a spritz.

Dinner: 7.30pm



Meet the Cheethams

The Cheethams - AKA sister influencers, Becky and Hannah - catch up with **Karl Taylor** to chat about assisted travel and their trip with us to Turkey.



So, let's get into it: why did you start your online platform, Cheethams with Dreams?

Becky: To spread positivity and awareness, particularly on Hannah's cerebral palsy. We also love chatting about topics important to the LGBTQ+ community and we're big on mental health.

Can you tell us a bit more about Hannah's disability, and what you need to think about when booking a holiday together?

B: Hannah can't walk or talk unaided, but she fully understands the world and communicates in her own way and with a communication device.

Hannah: I LOVE to travel, especially if it means flying to a hot country! But travelling isn't as easy for us as we would like - it involves a lot of planning and research beforehand to make sure everything's accessible

and safe when we get there. We look for things like lifts and ramps, and a walk-in shower. Extra points if there are beach wheelchairs.

Talking of hot countries, how was the journey to Turkey?

H: The airport and the flight out were amazing. Manchester Airport has always been great for us, and the attention from the cabin crew was great. The plane toilet opened into a double toilet – it was the best thing ever!

B: We can't get Hannah on a coach unless it's accessible, so the fact you helped us arrange a wheelchairaccessible transfer to the hotel was a game-changer for us.

We hear you stayed at TUI MAGIC LIFE Masmavi. What was that like? H: The staff were fantastic. The hotel had pool chairs, and the lifeguard



moved them to any pool I wanted to swim in.



Alice Preece chats to three family duos about what it's like to work together at TUI.

Nancy was 12 when she was stood with her mum in Lanzarote Airport, checking in for their flight home. Her mum happened to catch the eye of a man in the queue. His name was Guy, and he was also heading home from a TUI holiday with his kids. A conversation between the mum and dad began, and the seeds of a romance were planted.

Five years of marriage later, and Guy's in the cockpit of a TUI Airways Boeing 737. It should've been a normal day of training new pilots, but instead, his stepdaughter Nancy is sitting behind him, waiting to learn how to fly a plane. Nancy always thought she'd wanted to be a teacher, but mornings spent chatting about aviation with her stepdad had piqued her interest. "He'd send pictures of him enjoying a morning coffee at 32,000 feet to our family group chat," Nancy says.

I'm catching up with the pair now, about 15 months into Nancy's pilot training with TUI Airways. She tells me that, from flying small two-seater planes to spending days in simulators, the highlight of her training was when she got to fly with her stepdad.
